Paul tells us in three places about the nature of the gifts of God:

For to one is given the word of wisdom through the Spirit, and to another the word of knowledge according to the same Spirit; to another faith by the same Spirit, and to another	But to each one of us grace was given according to the measure of Christ's giftand He gave some as apostles, and some as prophets, and some as evangelists, and some as pastors and teachers,

These three passages provide us with merely an example of the various gifts and abilities given to members of the church for service to God and one another. Here is a list take from these examples:

From this list we can see three types of gifts: (1) those which were miraculous of the Holy Spirit and are no longer with us; (2) those which are natural abilities; (3) those which are created or added abilities.

Gifts that are gone: the list of gifts from 1 Corinthians 12 is a list of supernatural gifts from the Holy Spirit. In the next section of the text, Paul tells us that these gifts will cease: Love never fails; but if there are gifts of prophecy, they will be done away; if there are tongues, they will cease; if there is knowledge, it will be done away (1 Corinthians 13:8). We know why they ceased; in Hebrews 2:3-4 we are told why they came (After (the Word) was at the first spoken through the Lord, it was confirmed to us by those who heard, God also testifying with them, both by signs and wonders and by various miracles and by gifts of the Holy Spirit according to His own will), and then we are told in 2 Peter 1:19 that this purpose has been met; the Word has been confirmed (So we have the prophetic word made more sure, to which you do well to pay

attention as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star arises in your hearts). The Greek word for "confirmed" in Hebrews 2:3 is the same as the word for "made more sure" in 2 Peter 1:19.

Gifts that are natural: some gifts are natural talents that we have and use day to day. The "gift of gab"; the ability to find a good deal; the natural ability to lead others; a mechanical inclination. These gifts have a usefulness in serving God and others, although they may not be what we think of when we think of gifts from God.

Gifts that are developed: some gifts require effort to obtain. They are created or learned. For example: becoming a teacher - Hebrews 5:12; Becoming a speaker - Exodus 4:10-12; Becoming a caregiver - 1 Timothy 5:4; Becoming content - Philippians 4:11. These are all things we must learn.

The Greatest Gift: in each of the passages that Paul lists gifts, his ultimate gift in the end is love:

Love is the ultimate ability that we must develop in service to God and one another. When we neglect this gift, all others are pointless. It is the final step in 2 Peter 1:5-7 of spiritual growth.
